
A MESSAGE FROM PATRICK CONTINUED

CREATION CARE TEAM: RENEWABLE NATURAL GAS

Did you know that many landfills are developing renewable natural gas (RNG) plants onsite? These RNG plants help collect and clean the gas created at a landfill from decomposing waste, including food, wood, paper, etc. This cleaned gas is then pushed directly into the traditional natural gas system. This means that if you heat your home or cook with natural gas, you could be using cleaned landfill gas.

YOUTH TRIPS TO MEMPHIS, MASSANETTA SPRINGS, AND MONTREAT

The Youth Group packed it in this summer! We had delightful and engaged groups on each of our three trips: Memphis Youth Mission trip (9 youth and 2 adults), Massanetta Springs Middle School Youth Conference (11 youth and 2 adults), and Montreat High School Youth Conference (12 youth and 3 adults). A video encapsulating these experiences will come later this fall, and we invite you to ask any of these youth about their experiences. They might tell you about systemic injustice or the National Civil Rights Museum at the Lorraine Hotel or the Lynching Sites Project (or the Bass Pro Shop Pyramid) in Memphis; a giant slip-n-slide or their favorite energizers or how to play One-Night Werewolf or just how sure they are that God loves them as they are, from Massanetta Springs; the gifts of darkness (and not just light) or what they learned about "free-solo-ing" or our dance to "Popular" from Wicked or our 3:00 a.m. group affirmation.

These youth love each other deeply and well, and they are growing in their faith in beautiful ways, in and through these trips



















FAITH FELLOWSHIP, CHILDREN & YOUTH: WHEN GENERATIONS GATHER



In our everyday lives, it is easy to find ourselves separated by age and stage – children in schools, young adults building careers, parents connecting with other parents, and older adults living in retirement communities. Yet within our church walls, we have an incredible opportunity to connect these generations together, creating relationships that strengthen us all.

Research shows that to grow in faith, young people need at least five adults outside their family investing in them. What a calling for our church! Yet I also wonder if older adults might need the same – relationships with at least five folks of other generations – to continue to grow in their faith. Young people gain mentors with wisdom learned from experience, and older members discover they have much to learn as well. Children and youth bring fresh perspectives, honest questions that deepen understanding, and infectious joy that reminds us to approach God with wonder. When a child wonders, "Can God hear everyone's prayers at the same time?" or a teenager challenges us to think differently about justice, they become our teachers too.

We know these intergenerational connections reduce isolation, increase empathy, and create stronger communities. Beyond the research, we witness this truth time and time again at FPCA – in worship in the chapel and sanctuary, while at fellowship on the front lawn, and when folks slow down and stop to say hello in the hallways. Our joy is increased, our faith is deepened, and our welcome is wider when we experience consistent, positive interactions across generations.

Join us this August for an intentionally intergenerational class that will meet at 9:45 AM on Sunday mornings in the fellowship hall. These gatherings are designed to foster meaningful connections across age groups through shared conversation and fellowship. Whether you are seven or one hundred seven, your presence – and your story – could be exactly what someone needs to hear. Come expecting to grow as we experience the boundary-breaking love of Jesus Christ together.


