

A Message from Patrick

Dear Friends,

As we move through the final weeks of November and into December, we enter one of the most meaningful seasons in the life of the church. It's a time when the rhythms of our worship invite us deeper into the mystery of God's "once and future coming."

We begin with Thanksgiving, that remarkable theological holiday we share with all Americans, of every faith tradition and those of no faith. In a time when our differences feel so sharp, Thanksgiving offers us a unifying practice: gratitude. Gratitude tunes our hearts to God's presence as we become attentive to the gifts that surround us, the grace that sustains us, and the connections that bind us together. May this Thanksgiving be an opportunity for us to find common ground!

As we enter Advent, our worship series invites us into the theme of "Making Room at Christmas." We will explore how God breaks into our lives with hope, surprise, joy, peace, lament, and light. It's a counter-cultural practice in these busy weeks to not fill every moment, but to intentionally make room for the One who comes.

On the third Sunday of Advent, December 14, we'll celebrate in a special way as our choirs of all ages lead us in a creative service of lessons and carols. It will be a morning of joy, a time to let music carry our prayers and lift our spirits. One service on that Sunday, at 11 am.

Also on Sunday December 14, the session has graciously planned a reception and potluck lunch for the congregation after worship. I'm both humbled and grateful that this December marks my tenth anniversary as pastor of this great congregation. What a gift! Thank you for your partnership in ministry, for your faithfulness, and for the ways you continue to teach me about the love of God.

Our Christmas Eve services will have slightly adjusted times this year. The family service remains at 4 pm, designed with our youngest worshipers (and their delightful squirms) in mind. Our evening service will begin at 9 pm this year, and will be a bit more streamlined than in years past, offering a beautiful and meaningful celebration of Christ's birth, with communion, in a service designed to be accessible for all.

Throughout these weeks, there will be rich opportunities for fellowship, ministry to one another, for service through Saturday Sanctuary, and even space for lament and grief in the service of healing and wholeness. All of this is part of how we make room this holy season. I look forward to sharing it with you.

Come for a delicious dinner, followed by FPCA's traditional Love Feast. Led by the youth, this unique worship experience of song and prayer, candles, coffee, and Moravian cookies helps lead us into the Christmas season. The candles trimmed in red are reminders of Christ's love and of his life.

EPIPHANY DINNER & WORSHIP

Epiphany commemorates the first revelation to the Gentiles of Jesus Christ as the Savior, when the Christmas star led the Magi to find the new king (Matthew 2:1–12). We will also "chalk the doors" and ask God to bless our congregation in 2026, so invite your friends and neighbors out for a special evening of connecting and worship!

Together we read, discuss, and pray over the passage before worship—one participant even shared that it helped them feel "more ready for the sermon."



Through the month of December, **Faith & Fellowship** (in the Fellowship Hall) will explore art, incarnation and reflection through Honest Advent by artist and author Scott Erickson. Devotions will be emailed to all congregants several times each week, and on Sundays, we'll gather for conversation around the week's images and themes—seeing how the story of Christ's birth meets our lives with honesty, wonder, and hope.

YOUTH MINISTRY

FPCA Youth (grades 6–12) gather every Sunday morning during the school year for Percolating Presbies—a time of connection, games, learning, and discussion (with drinks and snacks!)—9:30 to 10:50 am in the Youth Rooms on the top floor. We also meet every other Sunday evening (typically 4:30 to 7 pm, though with some variance), to eat dinner, play games, reflect on life, deepen our relationships, serve others, worship, and pray. Retreats, service days, and Presbytery events round out the year. The youth will plan and lead the Moravian Love Feast on Wednesday, Dec. 10, and we will hold our fourth annual overnight Christmas Lock-in on Dec. 19–20.

YOUNG ADULTS - "STILL FLO!"

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

SATURDAY SANCTUARY

This ministry of hospitality, warmth, and lunch for our downtown neighbors is central to our identity as a downtown congregation. The season begins Oct. 11, and continues weekly until Holy Week in late March. Open to the community from 10:30 am until 2 pm. Volunteers sign up for 2–3 hour shifts in the kitchen (preparing food alongside Equal Plates, plating, cleaning) or fellowship hall (welcoming, serving, visiting, cleaning).

LOAVES & FISHES

THE IMPACT OF OPEN-HANDED GENEROSITY

In the days, weeks, and months following Hurricane Helene, we encountered a flood of a different kind. Dozens of notes, emails, checks, and online donations—from sessions, pastors, men's and women's groups, individuals; from the PC(USA), a handful of other denominations, and non-religious groups; literally from one U.S. coast to another—came pouring in. Our session assembled a small task force to research needs and agencies doing hands—on relief work and to make recommendations for disbursing these funds. In 2025, as the money kept coming in and long–term needs shifted, that role was passed to the Mission Committee.

These two groups spent dozens of hours learning, listening, and discerning together. FPCA was entrusted with these funds because people around the country believed we would know where their money could do tangible good. Join us in celebrating the generosity we saw in the wake of Helene and the vital work that our position and presence allowed us to support.
