## A Message from Patrick

**Dear FPCA Family,**

As we move through January into February, our congregation finds itself in a rich season. The 2026 theme "Making Room" continues to unfold in ways that invite us deeper into the welcome of Christ.

### **Making Room for Generosity**

Over the next few weeks, we are in our annual stewardship season with the theme "Making Room for Generosity." This is more than a budget campaign; it's a spiritual invitation to reflect on James 1:17, "Every generous act of giving is from above," and to consider how God's generosity shapes our own giving. The guiding prayer for this season is simple: "God, where do You want me to be in my giving?"

This stewardship emphasis supports our everyday ministries—worship, education, pastoral care, mission work, and daily operations. These foundations make our church whole and alive week after week. Later this spring, we'll have a separate opportunity for our capital campaign, "Building a Wider Welcome," with three-year commitments for property acquisition and facility improvements. Both expressions of stewardship are important and distinct.

You should have received information about "The Giving Path" by mail—a framework for considering where God might be leading you in generosity. On Feb. 1, we'll offer Estimate of Giving Cards during worship. Until then, I encourage you to pray, reflect, and listen for God's invitation.

### **Making Room by Letting Go**

Ash Wednesday on Feb. 18 begins our Lenten journey, and the sermon series this Lent will be "Making Room by Letting Go." We'll explore spiritual disciplines—fasting, prayer, silence, confession, simplicity, and surrender—as practices

that help us release what clutters our lives and make space for God's transforming presence. Sometimes hospitality requires letting go before we can welcome what God has for us.

### **Building a Wider Welcome Continues**

Our capital campaign reached a significant milestone on Jan. 4 when our congregation voted unanimously to acquire the property at 46 Aston Street. This property will expand our available parking and provide a building that can be used for future ministry opportunities. As we enter the initial commitment phases of the campaign, please prayerfully consider and plan to support our congregation's vision to extend a wider welcome through better parking, improved facilities, and enhanced hospitality.

### **Honoring Service, Welcoming New Voices**

On Jan. 25, we'll celebrate Beth Olwell's retirement as Executive Director of the First Presbyterian Child Care Center. Beth's leadership has shaped countless children and families, and we'll honor her service during worship that morning.

That same Sunday, Christian Chambers from Safe Shelter will share a Moment for Mission. Safe Shelter is a ministry we support financially and by sharing facilities, and Christian will help us see how this partnership serves our community. His visit is part of our stewardship emphasis on connecting generosity with meaningful ministry.

### **A Grateful Farewell**

At the end of January, Equal Plates Project moves to a new location in Haw Creek, where they can combine volunteers and staff in one place. This isn't only an ending but a new beginning for them. We'll continue to support them as they take this significant step forward, grateful for the partnership we've shared.

As we navigate these weeks of transition and invitation, I'm reminded that "making room" is always both a spiritual practice and a practical commitment. In our stewardship, we make room for God's work through our generosity. In our Lenten disciplines, we make room by releasing what no longer serves. In our capital campaign, we make room for future generations and expanded ministry. And in our transitions—both the goodbyes and the welcomes—we trust that God is making room for something new while honoring all that has been.

May we approach this season with open hearts, generous spirits, and confidence in the One who makes room for us all.

# Adult Faith Formation



## SUNDAY MORNINGS

Adults have two wonderful opportunities to grow in faith and community on Sunday mornings at 9:45 am. **Text Talk** (in Room 112) offers a chance to dive into the week's sermon scripture. Together we read, discuss, and pray over the passage before worship—one participant even shared that it helped them feel “more ready for the sermon.”

This season brings two great topics to explore in **Faith & Fellowship** (in the Fellowship Hall):

- **February: Wisdom for Real Life** — In a world where life is complex and certainty is often unavailable, wisdom matters. We will explore what it means to live wisely—not as having all the answers, but as learning how to live well. Wisdom is the practiced ability to perceive what matters most in a given moment and to act in ways that sustain life, our own, others', and the world. Through scripture, reflection, and conversation, a variety of teachers will highlight wisdom as it shows up in different areas of life, offering insight shaped by faith, experience, and everyday practice.
- **March: Letting Go to Make Room for What Matters** — You're invited to explore how a simple Rule of Life can help us live more intentionally with the time, energy, and relationships God has entrusted to us. A Rule of Life is not about rigid schedules or spiritual perfection; it is a flexible framework that helps us notice what truly gives life and gently let go of what drains it. In a season when life often feels crowded and demanding, this class will offer space to reflect, discern, and choose practices that support love of God, care for others, and faithful attention to our own lives.

## MID-WEEK OFFERINGS

### LENTEN KOINONIA GROUPS

Lent is a season that invites us to slow down and reflect on where we are placing our hope and how we are living it out. **Hope: More Than Wishful Thinking** will explore hope as a practiced way of life, shaped by the boundary-breaking love of Jesus and sustained through faith, community, and care for a broken world. These Lenten Koinonia Groups offer a welcoming space to engage this journey together through meaningful conversation, shared reflection, and prayer while building relationships in a small group format.



Participants will have flexible ways to engage with the weekly content. Each session will include a short 15-minute video teaching by Shannon Jordan, and you may also choose to read [Hope Is Here!](#) by Luther E. Smith Jr. as a companion resource. Watch the videos, read, or do a little of both—in short, participate in the way that best fits your season and schedule. **Scan the code to sign up by Feb. 1; groups will kick off with a shared lunch on Feb. 8.**

### PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

Presbyterian Women continue their theme of resilience with thoughtful lessons and meaningful fellowship. PW gather on the first Monday of the month, at 10:30 am in Room 112. On Feb. 2, Rev. Caitlin Johnson will lead a discussion on “Finding Our Joy in Christ,” and on Mar. 2, Jane Vann will lead “The Woman Who Was Bent Over.” All women are invited to join these monthly gatherings as we share in study, prayer, and conversation that encourage resilience and deepen our faith.

## CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

Children are a vital part of FPCA's worship and life together. On Sundays, children are welcomed in worship at 8:45 and 11 am, participate in Godly Play classes at 9:45 am, and older elementary children regularly assist in worship leadership at the 11 am service.

Godly Play communities are designed to nurture children (age 3-5th grade) in their relationship with God through story, play, and wonder. **In the season of Ordinary Time between Christmas and Lent, the younger children are exploring stories about Jesus, and older children are hearing stories of how God showed up in the lives of courageous people of faith like Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Harriet Tubman, and John Lewis.**

## NEW EXHIBIT IN THE GALLERY

**From the SHOAH to the Mountains – Choosing to Remember** is a 19-poster exhibit from the UNC Asheville Special Collections & University Archives, on display through Feb. 23. The exhibit explores the Holocaust through historical context, personal stories, photographs, and documents, including the experiences of refugees who found welcome in Asheville and the wider region. It invites quiet reflection on remembrance, responsibility, and the enduring question of how ordinary people become complicit in great harm. ## MAKING ROOM FOR GENEROSITY

FPCA begins its annual stewardship season this month with the theme "Making Room for Generosity." Over the next several weeks, our congregation will explore what it means to grow in generosity as a spiritual practice and response to God's abundant grace.

Megan Morlok, Stewardship Committee Chair, writes:

**"This season is deeply spiritual. Our guiding scripture comes from James 1:17, which reminds us that 'every generous act of giving is from above.'**

**The prayer that will shape our journey is simply, 'God, where do You want me to be in my giving?'"**

The campaign focuses specifically on supporting the church's regular annual ministry and mission—worship, education, pastoral care, mission work, and daily operations. This emphasis is separate from the "Building a Wider Welcome" capital campaign, which will launch in February and March with three-year commitments for property acquisition and facility improvements.

Throughout the season, the congregation will hear Moments for Mission each Sunday, illustrating how generosity through FPCA makes a tangible difference in people's lives. We will also receive daily email devotionals, written by Patrick Johnson, which started on Jan. 4. Families will receive two mailings: the first includes a letter from Patrick, a campaign brochure, and a record of 2025 contributions; the second contains a letter from Megan Morlok, a "Giving Path" chart to help discern where God may be leading, and an Estimate of Giving Card.

The campaign centers on spiritual growth rather than budget needs. The focus isn't the church's need to fund a budget, but each person's need to contribute proportionately as part of their spiritual maturity and discipleship with Christ. Everyone is invited to consider moving further along the Giving Path as a response to God's generosity.

On Feb. 1st, the stewardship season concludes as Estimate of Giving Cards are offered during worship, making our commitments an integral part of our gathered praise and thanksgiving. Each of us is invited to pray during this season, "God, where do you want me in my giving?"



Making Room for Generosity is an invitation to prayerfully seek God's guidance in the use of the resources entrusted to us.
